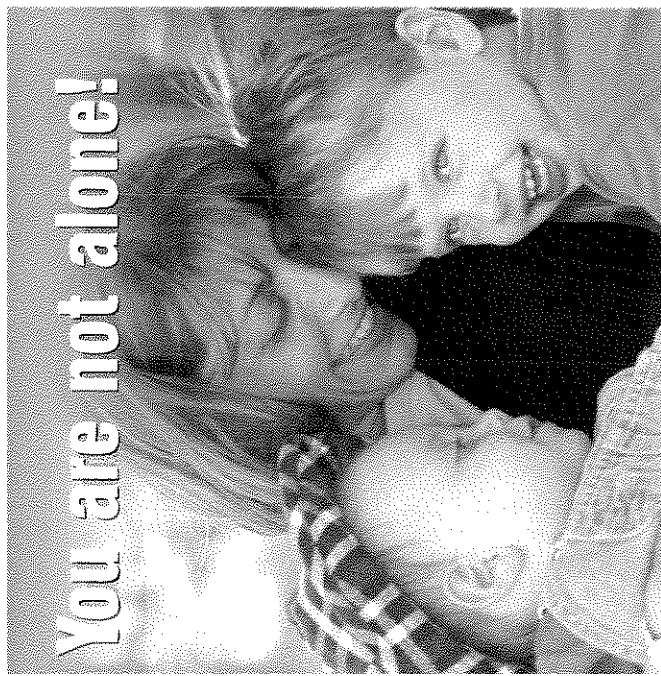


You are not alone!



Safe Nest (also known as Temporary Assistance for Domestic Crisis) incorporated in 1977, provides a variety of domestic violence services for victims and their families throughout Clark County.

Since 1978, Safe Nest (TADC) has operated shelters for battered women and children.

Safe Nest's shelter locations remain secret for the safety and security of their residents.

Residents at the Safe Nest shelter receive staff support and advocacy. Staff assist residents with a case plan, client independence and safety.

A crisis counselor will discuss options and safety planning as well as provide referrals to police departments, victim assistance programs, emergency services (food, medical, utilities/rent), legal services and more.

Whether calling for quick information, needing shelter or just wanting to talk, a crisis counselor is always available.

Shelter features include individual case planning, onsite support meetings, parenting classes and vocational assistance. Children's services include a playroom, playground and activities. We also provide shelter for pets.

Private and confidential, licensed marriage and family therapists provide individual and group counseling specifically addressing domestic violence issues for victims, batterers and children in the household.

Safety Plan?

No matter what, when or why, any victim involved in a violent relationship needs an emergency plan in the event of a violent incident.

The plan should include:

- An escape route.
- A way to call 911.
- Teaching the children to dial the police.
- A bag packed with clothes, money, spare keys and ID that is kept in a safe place or with friends.
- A safe, secret place to go. (This can be a relative or friend's home, motel or shelter.)
- A list of important phone numbers: such as,

Protective Orders

In Nevada, victims of domestic violence have the right to apply for a Protective Order Against Domestic Violence.

There are Temporary Protective Orders (TPO) and Emergency Temporary Protective Orders (ETPO) by Fax, when the batterer is arrested and in custody for domestic violence). TPOs may be granted for 30 days. If needed, victims can apply for an Extended Protective Order (EPO) after receiving a TPO. The EPO may be granted for up to one year.

A Protective Order may require the person who committed or threatened the act of domestic violence against the plaintiff/ applicant to:

- **Stop threatening, harassing or injuring the plaintiff**
- **Move out of the residence**
- **Stay away from the plaintiff's job**
- **Stay away from the children's school**
- **Stay away from private residences the plaintiff or children may frequent**
- **Avoid or limit all communication with the plaintiff or children**

Staff are available to assist victims with the application process.
